Other Issues

University Parking

As you will all be aware, thanks to the very hard work put in, predominately by Simon Massarella, we now have support for restricted parking within Clifton Village, to minimise the inconvenience caused by student and University staff members parking. Simon gives an update on this matter on page 10. He has done a great job, bearing in mind, initially, that we were told by the council that there were no funds available for what is now proposed.

Sky-Link Reroute

As you will also be aware, the Sky-Link bus that has run from Nottingham through to the Airport for a number of years has been re-routed, ostensibly because of a lack of support from the Airport, who used to actually contribute funds. Why it is cheaper to run it via Long Eaton than through Clifton, I don't know.

Fortunately however, Premier Buses have agreed to replace the service and full details of what they have on offer can be found on their website which is www.redflyer.co.uk. As far as I am aware the service will be hourly apart from between 04:00 and 07:00 when it will be half hourly, presumably to get people to and from work at the Airport.

A major concern for some in the Village is that the general stop on the green adjacent to the Police Station is omitted from the schedule. The bus will stop at the Man of Trent, but this means quite a walk for people. I have written to the company, pointing out the inconvenience and asking whether they could include this stop for the benefit of commuters and holiday makers.

I have yet to receive a reply.

On a positive note I would highlight that local bus services are also being stepped up to 'fill the gap' as it were, with the frequency of No.1 buses being increased. Details will be posted on the CVRA website but are available at: http://www.nctx.co.uk/assets/001TT_Mar12.pdf

Planning

Within the village there are two major issues, The Old Rectory and the Reading Room and there is of course concern regarding the redevelopment of the Man of Trent site on the other side of the A453, adjacent to the petrol station.

Old Rectory

Planning permission has been granted as we are now well aware and work should be starting any day. In fact I noticed a skip on the drive to the Old Rectory fully laden. Hopefully this is a good sign, although to my way of thinking, they will need more than one skip. Hopefully Mr Kumar will be keen to make a profit out of this site that he has held onto for so long and work will move forward at a pace. We will keep you updated as we learn more.

The Reading Room

It would appear that the Council now has taken on board fully, responsibility for the Old Reading Room, as denoted by the barrier fencing that has been placed around it, in case it should crumble and fall on anybody. As I understand it, they intend to do work necessary to make the Reading Room safe, and then sell it. Having said that, at the time of writing there is no indication of works commencing. The CVRA will continue to speak to the Council to ensure this situation is resolved as soon as possible.

The Old Man of Trent

Planning permission has been sought for a KFC and a McDonalds on the site. Following investigations, I have to report that there is very little we can do except object to this usage. We have therefore made representations, specifically regarding the fact that the developers are seeking a 24 hour license. It would appear from conversations I have had with local politicians that the Police will not be in favour of a 24 hour license and that their views are likely to hold sway, as indeed they did with the Garage.

Other Planning

Finally, I can report that there has been an application made for a change of use for the old Village shop Post Office, so that the entire property can be converted to a private dwelling.

I think it is a tragedy that the Village has, due to reasons beyond its control, lost the Post Office and then the Village shop, which one has to concede to be unsustainable without the benefit of the Post Office. It follows that in order to maintain its value and condition, a change of use was bound to be sought. One can only hope that, should a change of use be granted it will be conditional on any renovation, modernisation or renewal, being appropriate and in keeping with the history of the building and its prominent position within this conservation area.

That's it from me. I look forward to seeing many of you at the AGM and forthcoming social events.

Village Notes – Parking along Village Road

By now, you will have had a letter from the Nottingham City Council with regards to the new parking arrangements that will help us all here in Clifton Village.

The CVRA has worked tirelessly with the Council, Nottingham Trent University, Police and Local Residents to understand these issues over the parking “overload” within the Village, and realising that this is not just an issue due to local students either, but an issue to the Village from a wide, diverse range of people in their everyday business.

The Nottingham City Council has made proposals, not only for Clifton Village, but also to Rivergreen and also Fabis Drive residents (and surrounding roads) and these will be introduced during April 2012. Clifton Village has a two-phase approach, both phases deemed “experimental”, which allows for quick (and considered) changes, and the second phase will follow in about 18 months time, however, this depends upon a great number of factors, too many to mention here.

The proposals from Nottingham City Council, have been analysed, not only by the CVRA but also by you, some questions and queries have been forwarded through ourselves on your behalf, others directly. Whichever way we all respond, we, the CVRA, would like to keep you apprised of progress and that we continue to monitor and actively engage with all authorities in ensuring that we have a parking scheme that suits the Village and its Residents, now and in the future.

Please let the CVRA know your thoughts – we need to be able to offer constructive criticism to the Council and other parties, as individuals and as a “single voice”. We are your “voice” and it is the CVRA who have managed to start (and finish) the solution to this major issue and we would like to thank those certain individuals (you know who you are) who have helped us on our journey. Clifton Village resident Nigel Bates has bequeathed almost £300,000 in his will towards a new cystic fibrosis centre in Nottingham.

Nigel was just 53 when he died in November 2010 of cystic fibrosis, having being diagnosed in 1967. His sister died at this time of the disease at the age of six.

Nigel decided to change his will just 8 months before he died, when a nurse treating him for his cystic fibrosis mentioned City Hospital's plans to build a £6.6m dedicated centre for sufferers of the disease.

Nigel's sister recounted in the Nottingham Evening Post how "Nigel wanted to help others who were suffering from cystic fibrosis. He lost his sister when she was just six and this was an incredibly difficult time for his family. It wasn't until his sister was diagnosed that his parents thought he should have the sweat test and discovered he had the condition too. One day he simply said, 'I'm going to leave my money to go towards the centre', and that was the end of the matter. That was the type of person that he was. He wanted to help others and he had a wicked sense of humour."



Origins of Community Spirit – Part 1

The Foundation of the Residents Association

The CVRA had a long and erratic period of gestation largely because of the legal arrangements created by the Clifton family before their departure. Historically Clifton was a “close” village which meant that all the land and buildings covering the whole estate belonged to the Lord of the Manor. Everyone who lived here had to be a tenant and consequently everything that happened had to have the approval of the owner of the Hall. Indeed there is no public house in the village because an earlier Clifton disapproved of some drunken behaviour in the village and forbade the sale of alcohol as a result.

At the end of WW2 Nottingham City was desperate to expand its boundaries to the south but first had to persuade the Clifton family to leave its ancestral home and large estate. Very reluctantly the Cliftons decided to submit to the pressure which was being put upon them. They moved temporarily into the Old Rectory. Ultimately Col. Peter Clifton and his family chose to move to Dummer House in Hampshire. They were very concerned about leaving the villagers so the Clifton lawyers drew up documents in 1961 making 2 church wardens responsible for the old school buildings, the schoolhouse and the Wells Almshouses each of the latter being already tenanted. The school had been closed in 1959 when the City began to develop the new estate so the building was designated as a Village Hall. The intention was to secure the use of the school buildings for the benefit of the villagers in perpetuity. Who could be made responsible in the absence of the Cliftons? The legal solution was to designate the holders of church offices, which were expected to go on forever, as curators however many times individual holders of the offices changed.

There was always a close relationship between the College of Education and the church with senior staff either living on campus or in the village itself. Indeed when the Cliftons left, the Clifton family pews were occupied by the College principals during services. Clifton Hall was also converted to serve the new community as a Girls’ Grammar School in 1958.

By this stage the City Council had sold off some of the spare land along Village road as individual plots though the original villagers had been allowed to choose whether or not to buy their cottages or to continue to rent them from the new landowner.

Eventually, after a long interregnum, the Revd. Canon Wilf Wilkinson was appointed Rector because the Village population was slowly growing and there was also grave concern that valuable historic Clifton family monuments in the church of St. Mary’s were being vandalised. The Rector’s ambition was to restore the ancient church but the church wardens continued to take the administrative responsibility for the other buildings. The new Rector took his responsibilities very seriously and set about vigorously raising funds to restore the church.

Meanwhile the City Council decided to take the opportunity for further profitable development. The fields behind Village Road were sold to Gascoignes of Southwell who

created Spinneymead, that is all the new housing along, and adjacent to, Groveside Crescent. The developers also destroyed some of the original thatched cottages along Village Road.

At about the same time the Nieuwenhuys family who had bought Glebe Cottage had become agents for Gascoignes on site. Frank was a wonderful salesman who welcomed potential house buyers with hospitality and friendship. Indeed the Nieuwenhuyses organised the first group outing to the White Eagle Club in Sherwood. Thus were sown the seeds of a strong community feeling, particularly as most of the purchasers were incomers to Nottingham without family near at hand. Four bedroom houses were rarities in Nottingham at the very beginning of the "seventies" so Spinneymead contained many young families.

The Rector was in charge of such a large living that he had a curate, Stephen Oliver (who is now the retired Bishop of Bow in London). Hilary Oliver, the curate's wife, saw the need for a pre-school playgroup and in 1971 a committee was formed. Gwenda Ackroyd, who trained as a nursery/infant teacher became its supervisor. The school building had not been used very much since 1959 so the committee and parents spent many hours making it fit for use though the children's toilets were still outside across the yard.

Initially there was no Residents' Committee but outside events propelled action. It became common knowledge in 1973 that the A 648, in other words the relatively quiet local road to join the M1, was to be renamed the A453 so that traffic which had previously passed through Beeston and along the University Boulevard would be diverted to use the new river bridge to reach Nottingham and the east coast ports. A nucleus of people came together, determined to fight for a Clifton Bypass! There was also great anxiety about the council's proposal to build an extra development opposite the 1958 estate on the far side of Nethergate.

It became obvious that a formal structure was required and the Rector was the obvious person, together with the Church Wardens, Harry Moss and John Jenkins to form the nucleus of that committee. Georgie Turton who had been the first in the village to learn about the change of the road number was elected as secretary. She continued in that role until illness made her suggest Mavis Forsyth should be her successor in approximately 1980. These two ladies between them spent many hours attending Council Planning Meetings when it was possible for the public to do so. As a result the Village Residents' Committee was kept well informed about proposals which might affect the community. The local barrister, Bill Joss, was invited to be our legal representative and engaged lawyers to look after the interests of the Village when there were plans for building housing adjacent to Nethergate in about 1974. Presumably all who live here must be aware that the many battles about the A453 have had an unbroken history ever since then and that the people who live in the village have been leading protagonists in the fight.


