Chairman's Message

Hello, I would like to take this belated opportunity to wish all of you a very happy and prosperous new year. We have had a mixed bag of weather since the beginning of January, with some snow showers, some rain and wind, but also some very sunny interludes. Hopefully this will bode well for a splendid summer, ideal for the functions that we will be enjoying.



In terms of village gatherings in 2014 a real highlight at the end of last year was the unveiling of the new Clifton Village WW1 Commemorative Plaque. A very fitting occasion which was wonderfully organised, and well attended by young and old, including local councillors, the Royal British Legion and our Lord Mayor, Councillor

Ian Malcolm. Many thanks go to all for their support. I would especially like to express our thanks to Terry Kay for putting so much time and effort into organising the day, and for our new Remembrance Day Plaque to be installed, and to Keith Youlden for his musical support on the day.

After years of battling, we seem to be making some progress with a couple of the village "white elephants". The Reading Room is on track and whilst a little bit delayed, the council is busy reassuring us that everything is going smoothly. All one has to do is look at all the work going on and bearing in mind the fact that extra land has been bought by the purchaser of The Reading Room, there is no doubt that it will be a finished project in due course and a very welcome one at that.

Moving onto The Old Rectory; I was astonished when I first saw real work taking place. It doesn't seem to be progressing as quickly as we might have hoped from

first viewings, but there is obviously a commitment to spending money and reroofing, which one hopes may mean that, having got this far and having spent that much money, the developer decides to make the most of his opportunity and finish off the project.

With regard to the A453, there seems to be quite good progress but the current disruption is somewhat hard to bear. Hopefully it will only be short term. A major concern is the realisation that there is very poor consideration and few facilities for pedestrian crossings, which could mean a long walk for a lot of our residents and could encourage people to take a chance playing chicken with all the traffic.

There have been a couple of meetings, which unfortunately I wasn't able to attend, in which this was discussed, with the participation of a number of interested villagers. Simon Massarella has been dealing with all such issues on behalf of the CVRA, and hopefully with the support of those interested parties in the village, will be able to continue to make good headway and ensure that our relations with Laing O'Rourke, who are, at the end of the day, building to plans provided to them, can be maintained and their support encouraged.

For the beginning of 2015 we have a new innovation, thanks to the innovative thinking of Eileen Small; a couple of interesting lectures regarding the village and village personalities, "George Green – A Miller's Tale" and "The Woolley Diaries", Apparently the latter having nothing to do with Jack from The Archers. These will be well worthwhile attending and I hope to see a good turnout for both. As a special treat Jill Barker has agreed to reprise her inaugural speech, given on being made a Professor of Nottingham University. I can't wait to hear this again. Jill takes us through her path to her professorship, highlighting her three non-familial loves and makes light of all her achievements as well as the dangers she has faced in her passion for mountains. Not to be missed!!

Moving on we have got the Fish and Chip Supper, the Summer Garden Party. Village Notes

Travellers on the Green

The CVRA continue to campaign for a permanent solution to be found to the increasingly regular visits from travellers on the Green. Since our last issue, our local Councillors Chris Gibson, Jeannie Packer and Ian Malcolm via Area Committee have agreed to fund and instruct the Legal Counsel that Nottingham City Council are insistent is carried out before any type of barrier can be installed. This is to ensure that the 'barriers' are legal and do not transgress the Enclosure Acts of the 1840's. We are aware that budget prices have already been obtained for a number of built options and hope to bring you further positive news on this before the summer.

The Old Rectory

As you will hopefully have noticed as you pass, works have commenced on improving the Old Rectory. The village petition was handed to the Council in December, and the following response was received:

I refer to the petition submitted on behalf of the Clifton Village residents regarding the Old Rectory, a grade II listed building at risk. The conservation of the Old Rectory is a high priority for the City Council. Over recent years we have made repeated attempts to secure the necessary repairs to the building through negotiation with the owner, Mr Kumar, and his representatives. My understanding of the current situation is that Mr Kumar has instructed a contractor who is now in the process of carrying out roof repairs to the historic parts of the building. The repairs were discussed on site with the Council's Conservation Officer on Monday 5th January to ensure that they are being carried out on a satisfactory, like for like basis.

We have reason to believe that the urgent works to the roof will be followed closely by further works to the exterior render and the windows and doors of the building. Together these should ensure that the exterior envelope is made weathertight and secure. Should the works not be completed within a reasonable timescale or cease altogether, the Council will reconsider the service of notices under the Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act 1990. Please be assured that we will closely monitor the progress of this case and will take positive action to ensure a successful outcome.

The CVRA would like to thank all villagers who contributed to the petition, and to all other village members who have campaigned alongside us in recent years to make something happen. Our campaign will continue as the works are only 'temporary' to protect the building, and are not the start of something more permanent, but at least the entrance to the village will be vastly improved and the building better protected for the future.

The Village Hall

The latest update on the much needed Village Hall Car Park is that main contractors have been interviewed by the Trust in the last week - dialogue is ongoing with them to identify a preferred one to carry out the work. If a price can be agreed soon then the works should commence in the next 2 months and take only a further few weeks to complete. It is however uncertain at this time as to whether the full cost of the work can be afforded by the Trust, and are therefore still actively fund raising to support the full cost of the scheme. The CVRA and other community groups are continuing to support this work via fund raising through events such as the Village Christmas card and fund raising activity at Village events.

The latest plans and an update on progress will be given at the Village Hall AGM on the 18th May -7.30pm, at the Village Hall. There will be updates on Hall usage, the School House, and the accounts for 2014.

Street Lighting

Further to our last issue we can confirm that our local Ward Councillors have agreed to fund an additional heritage light fitting along the edge of the village green as requested by the CVRA last year. The area concerned is the current dark spot along the edge of the green past the end of the Schoolhouse as you enter the village. This light fitting will hopefully offer far better lighting and offer villagers the reassurance they need to make use of the footpath rather than feeling they need to risk life and limb walking up the road.

State of the Village Roads

Following recent NCC have replied to recent communication regarding potholes and Village road repairs as follows:

'Orders are raised on an individual basis for each road dependant on the risk assessment & type of repair deemed necessary. Village Rd was identified for F.C.A patching. This treatment is usually carried out within 28 working days & I can confirm this order is now complete. Groveside & Milldale Close were identified for new surface course only, which requires a different type of material and working method, on a 3 month basis (working days).To confirm none of the defects are at intervention ... & the order was raised as per planned inspection on a proactive basis to prevent the spread of surface erosion & avert damage to the base course.'

Gulley Cleaning

General "drain" clearance is now only once a year rather than the two/three in previous years. Although Clifton Village is quite good at not littering its drains, there is an increase in builder's waste, which has to be "fished out" by hand. Please be aware of your builders waste!

Village Parking Restrictions

Nov'14 is the date when the project was to be reviewed once more, taking into consideration issues, findings, raised concerns. As of November 2014 no further issues or concerns have been identified and we reported back to NCC Traffic Management accordingly. In order to stop upset or waste in time/effort, the final consultation was dispensed with and, as we understand, the phase II is now complete.

A453

CVRA have met with Councillors, made representations to Lillian Greenwood and met with Laing O'Rourke regarding the poor siting of the new village bus stops in relation to the route across the A453. The route to the village from the westbound side will, if not changed, require villagers to cross Glapton Lane westwards all the way to the new roundabout before returning up the opposite side to reach the village footpath. The concerns are the sheer length of the journey and therefore the natural temptation to simply try and cross all four carriageways to reach the path. We hope to have an answer on this soon.

The Village Green is NOT being ingressed upon with respect to A453 works, however, our trees have been protected (at our request) by railing/secure fencing. Damage to the Grass has been communicated by the CVRA to the Prime Contractor (Laing O'Rourke), who, in turn, have served notice upon their sub-contractors to make good, now and at the end of the A453 project.

The Nethergate Brook, which was cleaned and excavated within the last 18 months, which runs across the A453 from Green Lane into the brook on the LHS of the entrance to Village Road, causes us issues when in heavy rain (flooding). This has been discussed with LoR and with NCC – we understand that this will be a NCC issue and the CVRA are ensuring that further action will be taken to try and ensure that future flooding, once the A453 is complete, will not occur.

We have actively engaged with NET (Tram – Taylor Woodrow Alsthom) to ensure that the top end of Farnborough Road (with Clifton Lane – the Gotham Road) is opened both ways. This aids the roundabout at The Crusader and eases congestion. This is now open to Bransdale road.

The Crusader island/roundabout - we have engaged with LoR, NCC and our MP, Lilian Greenwood MP regarding the design, layout and phasing of the new Traffic Lights on this new island layout. It has been recognised as poor and not “worthy” and is being looked into. Phasing of the lights is being modified to suit the new layout and the sighting of Traffic Lights will also be looked into in the near future.

BT Fibre Optic broadband for the village

Installation has been delayed from May'14 to Oct'14/Mar'15 with the main reason being the NET Tram Works. BT Open Reach have informed me that they have no intention of providing this service offering until the Tram (NET) works are almost complete. The A453 works do have an impact on this decision also.

Village Trees


Permission IS required from the Nottingham City Council before any works are undertaken to larger tree specimens, due to TPO (Tree Preservation Orders) and Conservation Area status. This usually takes circa 6 weeks to receive such approval. The Nottingham City Council contact is Edmund Hopkins who can be contacted at edmund.hopkins@nottinghamcity.gov.uk or on 0115 8764054). NCC should be contacted if we require our trees to be coppiced, pollarded, trimmed or even removed.

20mph Village Roads

Responses to the Public Consultation we have received have confirmed that plans for blanket 20mph plans for the whole of Clifton have been rejected in lieu of localised controls around schools, shops and other ‘high risk’ areas. This will include the end of Green Lane near to Glapton School and also the main Clifton High Street but does not include any areas in the village.

GEORGE GREEN – A MILLERS TALE

DR. PETER ROWLETT OF NOTTINGHAM TRENT UNIVERSITY

George Green was 14 years old when his father built what is now Green's Windmill in Sneinton, and for most of the rest of his life he worked in the windmill. But George Green was also a brilliant mathematician and physicist. There is now world-wide recognition of his incredible success in devising new understanding of electricity and magnetism in spite of his scant formal education. His mathematics – still called Green's Theorem and Green's function – are used today by scientists and engineers all over the world working with computers, nuclear physics, lasers, satellite communications.

The George Green Library at Nottingham University commemorates his amazing contribution which was not fully recognised until the C20. Dr. Rowlett will talk about the life and work of this local prodigy.



A HISTORY OF CRICKET IN CLIFTON VILLAGE (PART 1)

On 11 June 2011 Clifton Village beat the Nottinghamshire County Cricket Club Academy side to move to the top of the Nottinghamshire Premier League. It was a position the Club was to retain for the rest of the summer. As a result Clifton claimed the Premiership title for the third successive season. There could be no argument that the team assembled by Clifton over the past few years was the finest that the village had ever raised. The secret of the side's success was undoubtedly the spirit and enthusiasm within the Club. The fact that their position was attained without the aid of an overseas star – and indeed in 2011 without even a talented member of the current Notts CCC playing staff – merely proved the point. Clifton Village Cricket Club is now considered one of the most progressive clubs in Nottinghamshire and the results of both the First Eleven, the two other senior sides and the two Ladies sides are proof of its standing. This has, however, not always been the case...

Old Clifton Village is today swamped by the post-war development of the vast Clifton Housing Estate and the campus of Nottingham Trent University, but until the 1950's it was no more than a small group of cottages near the parish church and Clifton Hall, plus some scattered farms. The Squire of Clifton would be a member of

the Clifton family and much of the land and property was “gifted” over the years by various Kings in return for favours on the raising of armies. The Squire ruled the lives of many of the inhabitants. Compared to many such families, however, they were very socially minded, providing and ensuring many aspects of village life be retained, one of which was the Cricket Club, to which they were heavily associated until the death of Lt Col Peter Clifton DSO in 1996.

Accordingly, for many years cricket in Clifton was infrequent as most village men would work for the Clifton family on their land or their properties, which included weekends, so many players played at the discretion of the Squire. The ground was simply a square cut in a field of humps and hollows, with a wooden pavilion, surrounded by a mass of wild flowers, trees and hawthorn or blackberry hedges. The game was played in the shadow of giant elms with children performing the maypole dance nearby. The ground itself was actually part of a tenant farmer’s land, and he was not a cricket lover as he seemed to take a great delight in letting cattle frequent the cricket field, with the result of a quite liberal spread of “cow pats”, which appeared to attract the cricket ball like a magnet!!


The origins of cricket in Clifton have been rumoured to begin in 1803, but the earliest evidence obtained to date can be traced back to 1813, when a diary held by one of the few inhabitants who could write, recorded the “playeing of a gayme” between 11 of Clifton against 22 of Nottingham over “two notches” and many bets laid. It may seem strange that 11 of Clifton took on 22 of Nottingham, but this was not an uncommon occurrence in such days, as it was probable that the 11 of Clifton were “imports” paid by the local squire. Much betting took place on such events in those times. It is even rumoured that the Wilford Toll Bridge, now recently converted to carry the tram over the River Trent, was built by Sir Robert Jukes-Clifton to help pay off gambling debts he had accrued – perhaps from bets lost after poor results by Clifton cricket sides??

Another entry in the diary records the details of a game on Wednesday 8 December 1813, between the Married men and the Bachelors of Clifton on Mr Thorp's land. They played for “2s 6d the loser, and a shilling the winner, all to be spent”. The bachelors beat them at one innings. It was almost dark before they had done playing, where they retired from the ground to Mr Langfords and spent the night very agreeably. “There was a great many Loyal toasts drank and

Loyal songs sung and all good company.” The Bachelors side comprised Benjamin Deveral, Samuel Fletcher, William Tongue, William Spencer, William Hoe, Thomas Wootton, William Lambert, John Reckless, William Reckless, John Langford and Thomas Hallam; the Marrieds read Thomas Langford, Robert Oldham, William Tyers, Robert Widdowson, Gervais Reckless, Thomas Butler, Robert Shaw, John Brooks, William Harraman, William Price and Thomas Brown.

The first newspaper notice of a Clifton match does not occur until 26 October 1828. Clifton are recorded playing the adjoining village of Barton-in-Fabis on Barton Moor. Barton were dismissed for 49 and 30; in reply Clifton scored 45 and 35 for three, winning by 7 wickets. Few records of matches between 1828 and 1854 have been found, and of the scarce few found from 1854 to 1884, they are filled with well known resident family names of Clifton Village like Butler, Price, Reckless, Hall, Moss and Wootton.

The last name on that list, George Wootton, a farmer from Clifton, was known as one of the best bowlers in England during the 1860's. But when interviewed after his career, he said, “I have always been a bashful man. When I was a lad at home in Clifton and could bowl as well as ever I could, I would slide off anywhere rather than play in a match. They used to offer me half-a-crown and 5s to get me to play.....I learnt my cricket here at Clifton and it was not until about 1860 (aged 25) that I went out as professional.” A prolific left arm fast bowler, he played for Notts from 1861 to 1871. In first class cricket Wootton took 984 wickets at 12.99 and his best analysis was at Sheffield whilst playing for England against Yorkshire when he took all 10 wickets in an innings. Still in his prime he retired back to his Clifton farm in 1871 and turned out occasionally for Clifton – he hit 73 not out for the village v Beeston in 1872. Later in life he was renowned for encouraging young cricketers, local as well as first class, for if not on the County ground on a

summer afternoon, he was generally on the village cricket field, as recorded by the Rector of Clifton in his book of 1906. The Clubs first real 'cricketing son', Wootton's name is engraved on the tenor bell in St Mary's Church in the village in recognition of his achievements.

Other villagers also became professional cricketers; in 1870 William Butler was pro at Swansea and Tom Butler at Cardiff, and William Moss was pro at Phoenix Park, Dublin between 1879-82.


“On Saturday evening December 15th 1883, a large and influential meeting of the cricket club was held in the schoolroom – DW Evans Esq in the Chair.” This is the opening line of the Clubs extant original Minute Book, and continues with the following proposition; “That in the opinion of this meeting it is desirable to adopt Mr Prior's scheme of amalgamating the Cricket and Football clubs and combining with these a Social Club....” Within 3 days the Squire had approved the idea, and given approval for them to rent a field, build a pavilion and call the Club 'Clifton Hall United Club'.

On 15 January 1884 Club Rules were adopted, and it is at this time that the cricket team became the Cricket Club in existence today.



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
