Village Notes

The Old Rectory



The work on the Old Rectory site is almost completed with just tidying up and some snagging to do. All unsold properties are now being marketed with a local estate agent. One of the three new homes are sold as are two of the premises linked to the Rectory. One of these is now occupied. We welcome our new residents to the village along with other new residents who have moved in recently, elsewhere in the village.

We hope you will all enjoy living here and would encourage you to come along to the activities that the community arranges from time to time, it being a good way to get to know other residents.



Village bollards

Councillor Andrew Rule has informed me that the council are awaiting to sign off on the agreement with the Clifton family and their lawyers to install bollards around the remaining, unprotected parts of the green. We are hopeful that we won't have to wait too long now before the whole of the village green has bollards.

Some of you may have noticed that one of the drop-down bollards that allows access onto the village green for grass cutting is missing. There has been some difficulty in obtaining a repair so currently it remains stuck below ground. The council groundsmen are awaiting advice.

An 'A' frame system, similar to those by the Grove, is proposed for the Nethergate path leading away from the green. This is to prevent motorcycles from racing up and down, causing danger to pedestrians and residents alike when using the footpath.

Housing Development behind Barton Green




Barton Green residents have resigned themselves to the fact that houses are going to be built on the fields beyond the bridleway. We understand that over 15 developers have submitted bids. The planning inspector reduced the number of houses to 265 from 280 houses, to take in the increased depth of the required buffer distance from Clifton Woods. Unfortunately, that reduced figure was not the one the council presented to developers. This we will need to monitor this, as now that our woods are designated as Ancient Woodland, they need protecting.

What Hawksley Gardens residents find hard to accept, quite understandably, is that the access to the site is to be through Hawksley Gardens only. We know how horrendous it has been along Village Road for almost a year. To think all the builders' traffic will access the Barton Green site via Hawksley gardens over several years is unthinkable, not forgetting the eventual residents' vehicles

having access that way to and from the new estate. The Hawksley Gardens residents have upped their campaign to highlight the problems of just using their road and have held separate meetings with our councillors and our MP. They hope that an extra access road can be created off the Fox Covert Road that connects eventually via the old A453, now Green Street, to the Mill Hill roundabout. Photos of our congestion here in the village during the Old Rectory developments have been sent to Lilian Greenwood and Cllr. Linda Woodings at the council, to highlight potential problems for Hawksley Gardens residents.

Proposed Sand and gravel Extraction at Barton in Fabis

Although the quarry, at Mill Hill, has been accepted in the County Council's minerals plan, the residents at Barton in Fabis continue their fight against it. As a part of the quarry area was also to extend on city land, the CVRA have been supporting actions taken by Barton in Fabis residents. We have arranged for meetings between them and our MP Lilian Greenwood with another arranged for this month.



Barton in Fabis residents have now shown their own MP, Ruth Edwards the site, highlighting amongst many things, the effect quarry workings will have on those of us who live nearby, including Lark Hill Retirement Village. She was shown where our footpath, joining our two villages, is to be closed as it would cut across the site, with no alternative being given.

With the change of leadership at the County Council, their MP is planning to talk to the new council leader with the hope of highlighting inaccuracies that were included, and valid items that were omitted, in the applicant's proposals for quarrying the site. Barton in Fabis committee members have also decided, at some cost, to create drone footage to show exactly how the proposed site will affect the surrounding areas. This will be far more illuminating than looking at the area on a map plus they can zone in on certain aspects of the site that will highlight problems that have not been acknowledged during the initial planning stages.

Update on Village Parking Permits

To simplify the parking system throughout the village it has been proposed to have permit parking for the whole area. University parking in the village was the prime reason for the need to have parking restrictions put in place originally. However, we currently have three different parking zones; the 2 hour no parking am and pm in Gervase Gardens and the first part of Village Road, no restrictions at all in the Holgate, Nethergate and Orchard Close areas and a one-hour no parking restriction am and pm in Groveside Crescent and the Closes off Groveside Crescent. Holgate has suffered from increased parking having no restrictions whatsoever and we have found that students and workmen alike have choked up the area to the detriment of the residents living there.

You will be pleased to hear that funding for permit parking is under consideration. When this is finalised residents would have access to 3 free parking permits. The council's website page 'Apply for a Residents Parking Permit' states:

The maximum allocation of permits per household is 3 and this is made up of any combination of residents or visitors permits.

Our councillors, Roger Steel and Andrew Rule would like to have one overall scheme and for us to indicate which timing option we prefer.

1. As exists in Gervase Gardens – permit parking only between 10 am and 12 midday and 2 to 4 pm.
2. Block Permit parking only between for example 9am and 5 pm – this would include existing permit holders as well.

These times are not set in stone but quoted as an example. Please pass on any other alternative suggestions to one of the committee members.

In terms of the area surrounding St Mary's Church, representatives of the CVRA, Holgate residents and the Church have met with councillors to discuss the specific needs of St Mary's, in order that the permit system does not impede day to day operations and clergy team attendance. The latest proposal is to exclude the crescent area in front of no. 2 Home Farm from the permit zone, in order that the clergy team can park there. Parking length restrictions (3 hours) are proposed for the Fishermans Car Park to discourage NTU all day parking, with 3 visitor spaces allocated along Holgate to allow for short visits to the Garden of Rest and other church events.

You may have other suggestions for the TRO (Traffic Regulation Order). For example, there has been a request for lengthening the double yellow lines further around corners because of safety concerns due to drivers parking too close to the bends. Village Road and Groveside Crescent plus Village Road and Holgate corners are of particular concern to residents, as well as the exit to Gervase Gardens.

To summarise these are some options to consider:

- **Blanket restrictions timings:** is 9-5 the best option for you? Other block timings are possible and other suggestions are invited.
- **Areas for double yellow lines (DYL):** Extend existing around dangerous bends.
- **Time limited parking bays:** 2 hours only parking bays on a section of Holgate and on one wider part of Village Road and or possibly Gervase Gardens?
- **Restrictions to River User's Car Park:** 3-hour parking maximum stay? Gives enough time for river users and walkers but deters all day university parking.

Please don't hesitate to get in touch with committee members if you have any comments to make on the suggestions above.

Meanwhile the Parking Enforcement Team can be called on 01158 761499 should any kind of parking problems occur.

The Dovecote

The issue of raising money to attend to refurbishing the Dovecote has been revived, now that lockdown is coming to an end. The CVRA have been in discussion with Alice Ullathorne (Heritage Officer for Nottingham City Council) and Chris Gibson (ex-councillor who is on the trust for Nottingham Heritage). The discussions are covering a proposed feasibility study which would set out to examine how the Dovecote could be used by the village and wider community. The initial focus will be to look at possible uses of the Dovecote that would allow for generating an income and ensure the building could be self-sustaining, after refurbishment. These are early stages and funding for a possible feasibility study has yet to be obtained.

SUMMER GARDEN PARTY 2021 SAFETY AND OPERATIONAL GUIDELINES

As we emerge from lockdown, no doubt we are all looking forward to a sense of normality returning to our lives.

We do though recognise that this normality will still be mixed with some concern and nervousness after over 12 months of isolation and restrictions. With these considerations in mind, we wanted to share with you our plans for the first CVRA event since the Christmas Party 2019, which will be our Summer Garden Party on Saturday 31st July 2021.

We have put a great deal of thought into the organisation of the event to ensure it is as safe and covid secure.

In order to provide all of us with as much comfort and safety as possible we are asking all guests to follow these guidelines.

1. When buying your tickets and organising yourselves please try to limit your group to a maximum of 6 adults if at all possible.
2. The event will be held in the garden of Holly House with a little more table spacing than in previous years.
3. Tables will be provided, but please bring your **own chairs and glassware**. We are asking you to bring glassware this year to reduce touch points, minimise handling of glasses and due to restricted washing up facilities.
4. In the event of rainy weather, the event may be held in Clifton Village Hall but we might have to cancel and refund monies unless attendees are happy to use the hall and we are able to do so.
5. We are asking everyone to take a **lateral flow test** the night before the event and only attend if you have a negative test result. Lateral flow tests can be obtained for free from pharmacies or from Trent University Clifton campus, at the NHS testing centre there after 2 pm on any afternoon.
6. When collecting your food from the buffet we will call you up one table at a time to avoid excessive queuing.
7. Please wear a facemask when collecting your food.

8. Antibacterial gel will be provided at the buffet – please antibac. your hands before picking up your plate and selecting your food.
9. The buffet will be assisted service -ie we will have friendly service staff to help serve and there will also be self-service elements of the buffet.
10. We will sterilise the service spoons / forks after each group have collected their food.
11. Desserts will be in individual serving pots.
12. We will be using disposable plates and cutlery.
13. Please feel free to bring additional anti bac wipes for your tables etc if it gives you additional comfort and peace of mind.
14. Toilet facilities will be controlled by a clear queueing system and with additional paper hand towels and sanitiser gel.

Additional details will follow and we will issue reminders of the processes on the day.

VE Day Celebrations - Part 2!

Below is the final section of our village resident's account of what he got up to during WW2. What a wonderful thing to produce for a lucky granddaughter. We must thank our resident for sharing it with us.

No wonder he wanted to remain anonymous as you will read below. You wouldn't want to sully your respectable character but great fun even so!

In boyish terms I WAS RICH!

My 'foster parents' belonged to a social club whose members gathered at a large hall in the evenings to talk, play games, drink and eat. The eating was where I came in. It demanded that fish and chips be bought. So, I'd go round taking orders and the money and go off to the local chippie to buy them. On returning with the goods all my 'clients' were in a joyful, happy mood, not necessarily remembering how much money they had given me and were disposed, with a little encouragement to say: "Keep the change."

I also had another job. At that time, there existed men called 'rag and bone merchants', who would as the name implies, go round buying up rags, (I'm not sure about the bones). In order to ply their trade, they had to have a horse and cart, and the horses, which were kept some way out of the town, had to be collected every morning and hitched up to the carts.

Your enterprising grandfather managed to collar one of these collection jobs. It consisted of catching the horse in its field, harnessing it and riding it bareback into town, where it was hitched to its cart. The horses were filthy, so my trousers became filthy too, besides wearing out at an alarming rate. Since clothes were only available with coupons, this presented a problem, more about which later.

There was one major problem with this job. Catching a horse that did not want to be caught! Roy Rodgers was popular at the Saturday morning cinema at the time and he was good at lassoing a horse but none of us seemed able to learn the art.

I was becoming evacuee business boy of the year, when what do you think happened? That sneaky sister of mine wrote to our mother saying that she thought I was being neglected and becoming wild etc., etc., and she thought I was going to the dogs etc., etc. Combined with the inexplicable requests for new trousers, my mother became worried and decided to pay a visit and find out the situation for herself.

The result was foreseeable! Back home with the lot of us. By that time the bombing was less frequent and we had found a more permanent house to live in, so we settled down and hoped that life would be a bit quieter now. Unfortunately, that was not to be since Hitler started up again with his 'doodle-bugs'(V1's) and later the V2 rockets. We suffered some pretty severe damage to our house from a 'doodle-bug' which landed nearby and put us out of our house for a short period but nothing as serious as the first bomb.

The End

Well, how unlucky to have a bomb hit your house two times over the period of the war! I imagine some of you in the village can sympathise with a young boy trying to capture a reluctant horse. What an amazing account of a boy's war time experience. Thank you so much for allowing us to print it 'Grandad.' Your identity will be kept a secret but we can't help wondering...

NG11 Clean Champions - Update



The dedicated efforts of volunteer residents continue to help keep the area litter free and now with the eased COVID-19 restrictions team events have been restarted. Once a month on the second Saturday at 10.30 am (for one hour); start points are communicated a week beforehand.

The area cleared on a weekly/fortnightly/monthly basis includes: from Lark Hill traffic lights to Crusader Island then onto the A453 to Silverdale Island, Clifton Village, Barton Green, Silverdale, Noble Road and The Grove communities,

Trent river paths and woods and from Crusader island to the A453 Fox Covert layby. NTU and the A453 Mc Donald's, KFC and Tesco Express stores, continue to help too. Recently B&Q Riverside kindly agreed to donate a "garden claw" which is great for reaching under bushes. The area is looking much cleaner not because litter is decreasing but because there are more volunteers clearing, on a regular basis. Thank you all for your efforts. To try and affect the anti-social behaviour of littering, by irresponsible pedestrians (adults and children) and drivers (vehicle and cyclists), the local council really need to consider some alternative measures: more public bins and positive signage to encourage the use of bins, to simply take their rubbish home to respect where one lives by keeping it litter free! If every resident and business ensured their "front step" was kept litter free then that would make a huge difference.



Clifton Village "Fisherman's" car-park was a constant "litter hot-spot" despite the fact that there is a public bin available; "irresponsibles" had problems making it to the bin! For a while, bags for litter were placed on the fence posts around the car-park. With resident Francis Buck the area was marshalled, litter

cleared, bags swapped when full and this helped to an extent. However, the fence post bags did look unsightly and having approached Cllr Andrew Rule who also joins volunteers when free, he very kindly agreed to fund another bin. Situated at the rear of the car-park the bin is certainly used although the area is still marshalled for odd litter that didn't quite make it to one of the bins!

The A453 of Clifton is a major arterial road into Nottingham, volunteers keep it litter free but the road gullies need to be cleared of weeds and detritus. The council Streetscene team amongst their many responsibilities empty public bins and collect the bags that volunteers fill. Clifton Village Hall & School House Trust

Since my last report in October, the hall was reopened for a short while in November and December for a limited number of regular users due to the restrictions on numbers permitted under the COVID Government guidelines. Following the third lockdown, the hall has been closed until the second week in April when, again, a limited number of regular users recommenced using the hall. As further restrictions are lifted, more of our hall users will be permitted to return and hopefully larger gatherings will be permitted indoors in due time. During September last year, a Martial Arts group started sessions on Wednesday evenings and Saturday mornings, and on 25th May in the morning a Line Dancing group is starting. Whilst Karate, Adult Dancing, Rainbows, Brownies, Guides, and a church group, Graceful Voices, are back in the hall together with Martial Arts, there are no firm dates yet for when Pilates, Tai Chi and the Clifton Doves WI will be returning. The reduced hall activity has had a severe impact on our income but we have managed to obtain a grant available to community halls to offset the financial implications of the COVID pandemic. Unfortunately, the grant we applied for to undertake the new hall development was unsuccessful, so we are continuing to explore other opportunities to cover our shortfall. A raffle will be organised as usual at the Summer Picnic – raffle prizes are very welcome – and please give generously and purchase lots of tickets on the day!

We are very pleased that the tarmac road through the Village Green leading to the Village Hall carpark has been repaired (no more potholes!), and very recently, also the gravel road alongside the School House. The costs of these have been kindly met by Tomlinson's, the builders on site at the Old Rectory – in return for the use of the Village Hall car park over the last 17 months. This facility has helped to ease the traffic congestion in the Village with as many as 22 vehicles being parked in the car park at any one time!

St Mary's Church

Last Summer and Autumn, due to the pandemic, we alternated our Sunday services between 'Garden Church' in the churchyard at the back of the church and 'Private Prayer'. These continued until the beginning of October, when services were moved inside. Following the 2nd lockdown, St Mary's closed again but services commenced via Zoom. However, our weekly Home Worship packs continued to be distributed as they had been since the pandemic had started, including packs for children.

When restrictions were briefly lifted again, before the 3rd lockdown, indoor services were limited to a Christingle service and an 'Open Church' for those who wished to remember those who had passed away – and weekly Zoom services continued. However, we were delighted that Whitegate School were able to visit St Mary's for the Christmas story.

For the first time, the Community Carol Service was held on the Village Green outside the Village Hall – this attracted a large number of people and was supported by the St Mary's Singers – and may be repeated later this year. Now that restrictions are easing, weekly services have recommenced inside to which everyone is most welcome – please see details in this newsletter. Bellringing has also recommenced but due to the size of the Bell Tower the number of bellringers is restricted.

During the last few months, regular maintenance has continued but a perished electrical cable between the boiler room and the heating control programmer in the Vestry had to be replaced. A temporary sound system has also been installed to complement our current loop system. In the coming months, we are due for our Quinquennial Inspection and Ecclesiastical review.

Unfortunately, our Ceilidh last year had to be cancelled but it has now been rebooked for Saturday 9th October – more details nearer the time. We will also hopefully be organising a concert – details to follow.

We are seeking people to help with cleaning the church and also helping with some gardening aspects in the churchyard, including the Garden of Rest. If anyone would like to help in anyway, can they please contact me – thank you.
